RE: Iowa Survey on Gun Laws

From January 30th to 31st of this year, RABA Research conducted a statewide survey of 939 likely 2020 voters in Iowa on behalf of Giffords using a combination of automated calls and online surveys of cell phone-only households.

MAJOR FINDINGS

Iowa voters overwhelmingly support background checks on gun purchases. 86% of voters support a background check on all gun buyers, with only 7% opposing it. This support crosses party and geographic lines, with 89% of Democrats and 83% of Republicans agreeing, as well as 83% of voters living in rural areas.

Voters oppose allowing non-law enforcement officials to carry concealed firearms into schools. Overall, 50% oppose this idea, with only 31% saying they support it. Another 19% were unsure. Among rural voters, 47% opposed the idea, with 35% supporting it.

Weakening Iowa's current gun laws is a losing proposition for state lawmakers. Overall, 54% of voters say they'd be <u>less likely</u> to support a legislator who voted to weaken Iowa's gun laws, with only 15% saying more likely. This includes 61% of Democrats, 46% of Republicans, and 54% of independents saying they're <u>less likely</u> to support such a candidate.

There is little appetite for changing the Iowa Constitution to help weaken current gun laws in court. Iowans oppose this idea by a margin of 2:1 (39% oppose, 18% support). Among Republicans, the margin is even greater than 2:1, with 35% opposing and only 14% supporting it.

Voters are poised to reward candidates who pledge to strengthen background checks. Overall, 72% of Iowans say they're <u>more likely</u> to back a candidate who takes this position, with only 10% saying less likely. 64% of Republicans and 69% of rural voters would be <u>more likely</u> to vote for a candidate supporting stronger background checks.
